Authorities Identified Suspicious Item That Forced Evacuation At Metro Airport

Detroit Metro Airport's North Terminal was evacuated around 5:50 a.m. April 1 after a suspicious object was found at a Transportation Security Administration (TSA) passenger screening checkpoint. Airport officials say further analysis of the contents of the passenger's carry-on bag revealed three electronic items duct-taped, wrapped, packaged and positioned together in such a way as to pose a possible explosive threat. The man, a Delta employee, used his work identification to get to the plane using the airport's secure area after officials had seen him go through a secure door but then lost track of him. US on missile watch as North Korea celebrates Kim dynasty

South Korea and the United States were on high alert for a North Korean missile launch on Thursday as the hermit kingdom turned its attention to celebrating its ruling Kim dynasty and appeared to tone down rhetoric of impending war. Despite threats it will attack U.S. bases and the South in response to any hostile acts, North Korea started to welcome a stream of visitors for Monday's birthday celebrations of its founding father, Kim Il Sung. U.S. Embassy in Turkey Said to Be Targeted

Turkish police said they had found evidence of a plot linked to Al Qaeda to bomb the United States Embassy in Ankara, in Istanbul and other targets, from a raid on two houses in February. The reports said the police had seized nearly 50 pounds of plastic explosives with detonation systems attached, as well as six laptop computers and other evidence. Twelve people were detained during the operation — two Chechens, two Azeris and eight Turks. [Read more](#)

Chemical reaction explosive 'pranks' a concern

Investigators in St. Johns County are seeking information to lead them to those involved in several separate incidents of chemical reaction devices, or soda bottle explosions, in the World Golf Village area within the last six months. Detectives said they began investigating the first incident in November when a device containing mixed household chemicals was placed in a Dumpster in the parking lot of McDonald's in the 100 block of Tuscan Way and detonated as the victim was driving past. A hoax anthrax threat made to an inner-city Auckland hotel is being investigated by police. A malicious phone call was made to the Grand Chancellor Hotel, police said in a statement. Bomb found in south Lebanon
