## Lebanon seizes bomb-laden car days after 27 killed in Beirut attack

Lebanese security forces seized a car loaded with explosives and arrested four men suspected of preparing bombs, days after a deadly bombing in southern Beirut, security sources said on Sunday. The car was discovered on Saturday about 15 kilometers (10 miles) south of the capital in Naameh, laden with five containers of TNT as well as nitroglycerin, they said. [Read more](#)



## Husband of NSA-leak reporter held under U.K. terror law

The partner of the journalist who first reported on the mass surveillance by the U.S. National Security Agency was detained at London's Heathrow Airport on Sunday and questioned for hours under Britain's anti-terrorism law, according to the Guardian newspaper. American writer Glenn Greenwald, who broke revelations by whistleblower Edward Snowden in a series of articles for the London-based Guardian, called the treatment of his partner, David Miranda, "despotic." ## Indian police arrest alleged top terrorist

Indian police said Saturday they had arrested a top militant accused of helping mastermind the 1993 Mumbai blasts and over 40 other deadly bomb attacks across the country. Seventy-year-old Abdul Karim Tunda, an alleged member of the banned Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) group, was arrested by a special Delhi police team near the border with Nepal on Friday. ## U.S. nuclear reactors vulnerable to terrorist attack: study

More than ten years after the 9/11 hijackers considered flying a fully loaded passenger jet into a Manhattan area nuclear reactor, U.S. commercial and research nuclear facilities remain inadequately protected against two credible terrorist threats — the theft of bomb-grade material to make a nuclear weapon, and sabotage attacks intended to cause a reactor meltdown — according to a new report prepared under a contract for the Pentagon.
