#### A Move From Manual Baggage Processes To Technology

As passenger traffic recovers, airport operators and airlines are expected to install advanced systems for efficient passenger management and baggage tracking to improve passenger experience and ensure smoother operations, which in turn is expected to lead to significant changes in the baggage handling process. The demand for contactless and self-service technologies at check-in and check-out is also expected to be reflected in baggage handling operations. To increase baggage tracking, many airlines and airports are choosing RFID readers throughout their luggage handling systems. These RFID readers can be placed at multiple points within the baggage handling system, including mandatory entry and exit points.



#### U.S. Transit Passengers May Be Spared Security Screening At Taoyuan Airport

Taipei, June 25 (CNA) Taiwan and U.S. transportation officials will meet next month to discuss a plan to allow passengers on flights from the United States to transit through Taiwan without having to undergo an additional security check, Taiwanese officials said Sunday. Speaking to CNA, Civil Aeronautics Administration Director General Lin Kuo-shien (林國顯) said he will be part of a group heading to the U.S. in late July to discuss the plan with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA). The group will also conduct onsite inspections of the Los Angeles and San Francisco airports, he said. After the group returns to Taiwan, the Aviation Police Bureau will submit a report on the proposal, which if adopted, could reduce transit times by 30-60 minutes, Lin estimated. Han Chen-hua (韓振華), deputy head of the Transportation Ministry's Department of Navigation and Aviation, said the new transit procedures could be rolled out in the second half of this year. From Taiwan's perspective, he said, the policy would help increase the number of transiting passengers from the U.S., thus bolstering the government's efforts to establish Taiwan as a regional transport hub.

#### Dominican Republic Participates In Meeting On Aviation Security

The Eleventh Meeting of the Regional Group on Aviation Security and Facilitation has commenced, with delegates, representatives, directors, and authorities from 20 countries, including the Dominican Republic as the host country. The event, taking place from today until June 23, focuses on regional issues concerning member States and territories of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO). During the meeting, attending delegations will receive updates on initiatives aimed at enhancing the effectiveness of facilitation committees, the progress of the project for passengers with disabilities, and the proposal for raising awareness and monitoring the Roadmap of the Identification Program of ICAO Travelers (TRIP) in the region. Additionally, discussions will cover the assessment of progress in facilitation, Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), and electronic passports (ePassports).

#### Safer Skies Initiative Integral to Prevent Shooting Down of Civilian Aircraft

Canada's *Safer Skies* initiative is crucial to avoiding repeats of the shooting down of civilian aircraft, ICAO Council President Salvatore Sciacchitano advised delegates at a recent forum on the topic, but States must ramp up the political momentum around implementation and exchange of expertise. The Third Safer Skies Forum was convened by the Governments of Canada and the Netherlands in support of progress "towards preventative conflict zone risk management practices," and took place in Rotterdam and the Hague on 5 and 6 June.

#### Afghan National Held At IGI Airport With Fake Indian Documents

An Afghan national, who arrived at IGI Airport's international terminal, was arrested for travelling on forged Indian documents, an official said. Fake Indian documents including passport, Aadhaar, pan card and driving licence, have also been recovered from him. The accused was identified as Esmat Khan alias Anwar Khan, a resident of Paktika in Afghanistan. The officials said that he had obtained the documents fraudulently, which is being investigated. According to the FIR, which is in possession with the IANS, on May 24, Anwar Khan arrived from Kabul, Afghanistan on terminal-3 and approached for immigration clearance.



## Head of Security For Yangon International Airport Assassinated

international airport was gunned down in front of his home in Mingaladon Township, Yangon on Monday evening. Yangon International Airport's head of security Ye Khaing, 46, was fatally shot on Khayae Yeik Thar Street 1 at a complex serving as a residence for many retired military officers, and died shortly after arriving at Military Hospital No. 1 in the same township. The military council has yet to release a statement regarding the assassination, but posts in pro-junta Telegram propaganda channels said that two men on a motorcycle shot Ye Khaing repeatedly in the head and neck, hitting him a total of nine times. The Urban Owls, a Yangon-based urban guerrilla group, released a statement on Monday evening claiming responsibility for the attack on Ye Khaing.
